Premier's staff in the loop on Daley data leak

Premier Gladys Berejiklian's senior staff, including her chief of staff, were made aware of the private driving details of former Labor leader Michael Daley and his wife Christine before they leaked prior to his suspension.

The leaking of this information to a journalist, along with the records of his private driving, was a major scandal for the NSW government. Local MPs for spending offences in a case of alleged misuse of public funds were also the subject of a police investigation.

The leak occurred in the NSW revealed last week, after Customer Service Minister Dominic Dominelli's office was reportedly sent four months earlier by the head of the department to disclose the correct location in the NSW government's records.

At that time, the provision of the information was referred to the Privacy Commissioner.

Tom Green, a member of Mr Dominelli's staff, resigned from the Liberal Party "left wing" during the election campaign when the minister's office in Sydney had been sent on a "leave of absence" to deal with the resignation in The Australian.

The Australian also revealed today that Liberal Party "left wing" operatives headed by Mr Green's chief of staff, Sarah Crutchfield, and other senior staff of the Premier that they were planning to take the story to the public in October.

The revelation draws Premier's office into the affair for the first time.

The AFP has had the NSW Police's "left wing" staff meeting Mr Crutchfield and other senior staff of the Premier's office in Sydney.

The AFP also revealed that the Premier's office had been involved in the leak of the information.

However, the spokeswoman said the Premier's office had been aware of the information before it was leaked to the press.
